MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

DECEMBER 13, 2018

Pursuant to the Warrant of the Select Board, served according to law upon the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline by a Constable of said Town and pursuant to Section 2.1.5 (Notice of Meetings) of the General By-laws of the Town of Brookline, and written notices sent by the Select Board, at least fourteen days before the meeting to the Town Meeting Members qualified to act in Town Meetings in Brookline under the provisions of Chapter 43A of the General Laws of the Commonwealth, as amended, and accepted by the Town of Brookline on March 10, 1942, the Town Meeting Members, so qualified, met at the Roberts-Dubbs Auditorium at Brookline High School in said Town on Thursday, December 13, 2018 at 7:00 P.M.

Lists of the duly qualified Town Meeting Members were used at the entrances to the meeting place and were in the charge of Checkers, who were appointed by and sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Town Clerk. These lists contained the names of two-hundred forty-seven (247) Town Meeting Members qualified to vote in Town Meetings in Brookline.

No Town Meeting Members were allowed within the rails until they signed the check-in lists and received their electronic recording device.

At seven o'clock, the Checkers reported that one hundred and thirty (130) signatures of Town Meeting Members had been checked, or more than one-half of all qualified Town Meeting Members, and the Town Clerk reported to the Moderator that a quorum was present.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator Edward N. Gadsby, Jr. – TMM #AL and he acknowledged the proper posting of the Warrant.

The first verse of the Star Spangled banner, led by James M. Slayton - TMM #7, was sung by the audience.

The Moderator made several announcements concerning seating, and the operation of the electronic recording devices. The Moderator then conducted a mock vote to test the devices.

The Moderator then offered a non-religious invocation that had been provided to him several years ago by a colleague, which he believed as being particularly apt for this Town Meeting.

INVOCATION

We come together in civil assembly as a community. In a tradition that is older than our commonwealth itself. We come together to make decisions about our community. As we deliberate, let us advocate for our positions but not at the expense of others. Let us remember that there is an immense gap between saying I am right and saying I believe that I am right and that our neighbors, with whom we may disagree, are good people with hopes and dreams as true and as high as ours. Let us always remember that in the end - caring for each other in this community is of far greater importance than any differences we may have.

FIRST ARTICLE

Submitted by: Human Resources

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate, or appropriate from available funds, a sum or sums of money to fund the cost items in collective bargaining agreements between the Town and various employee unions; fund wage and salary increases for employees not included in the collective bargaining agreements; and amend the Classification and Pay Plans of the Town, or act on anything relative thereto.

Upon motion of Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL and seconded by Sean M. Lynn-Jones – TMM #1, it was UNANIMOUSLY

VOTED: That NO ACTION be taken under Article One.

SECOND ARTICLE

The following motion was offered by Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL and seconded by Bernard W. Greene – TMM #AL, for the Select Board:

MOVED: That the Town appropriate \$1,500,000, to be expended under the direction of the Building Commissioner, with many necessary contracts to be approved by the Select Board and the School Committee, for the schematic design services to construct or expand the Driscoll School and to meet the, appropriation transfer \$1,300,000 from the overlay surplus account and \$200,000 from free cash.

The following motion was offered by Sean M. Lynn-Jones – TMM #1 and seconded by Carla W. Benka – TMM #13, for the Advisory Committee:

MOVED: That the Town appropriate \$1,500,000, to be expended under the direction of the Building Commissioner, with any necessary contracts to be approved by the Select Board and the School Committee, for the schematic design services to construct or expand the Driscoll School, with the condition that no funding may be used for the design of non-emergency fossil fuel-operated building systems, and to meet the appropriation transfer \$1,300,000 from the overlay surplus account and \$200,000 from free cash.

Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL, on behalf of the Select Board, urged Favorable Action on the main motion offered by the Select Board.

Susan Wolf Ditkoff, a member of the School Committee, urged Favorable Action on the main motion offered by the Select Board.

Harry K. Friedman – TMM #12. urged no action on the main motion offered by the Select Board and the amendment offered by the Advisory Committee,

David Lescohier – TMM #11, on behalf of the Advisory Committee, urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee’s fossil fuel amendment.

Werner Lohe – TMM #13 urged favorable action on both the Main Motion and the fossil fuel amendment offered by the Advisory Committee.

Student members of the Driscoll School “Kids Expect Environmental Protection” (KEEP) Club urged favorable action under Article Two to make Driscoll a green school.

Urging Favorable Action on both the main motion, and the fossil fuel amendments offered under Article Two and Article Three, were Kathleen M. Scanlon – TMM #3; Brian Hochleutner – TMM #6; Alyssa G. Jonas – TMM #16; and Benjamin Hellerstein – TMM #2.

Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL, cautioned Town Meeting of the projected costs of new construction to achieve net zero buildings.

There was a request from the floor for an Electronic Recorded Vote to be taken under Article Two. More than thirty-five Town Meeting Members stood in support of that request.

Upon motion of Sean M. Lynn-Jones – TMM #1 and seconded by Carla Wyman Benka,- TMM #13, it was by an ELECTRONIC RECORDED VOTE of 217 IN FAVOR, 4 OPPOSED AND 5 ABSTENTIONS, to amend the Select Board’s main motion as follows

VOTED: To amend the main motion as follows:

That the Town appropriate \$1,500,000, to be expended under the direction of the Building Commissioner, with any necessary contracts to be approved by the Select Board and the School Committee, for the schematic design services to construct or expand the Driscoll School, with the condition that no funding may be used for the design of non-emergency fossil fuel-operated building systems, and to meet the appropriation transfer \$1,300,000 from the overlay surplus account and \$200,000 from free cash.

Upon motion of Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL and seconded by Bernard W. Greene – TMM #AL, it was by a COUNTED VOTE OF 220 IN FAVOR AND 2 OPPOSED, to adopt the main motion, as amended

VOTED: That the Town appropriate \$1,500,000, to be expended under the direction of the Building Commissioner, with any necessary contracts to be approved by the Select Board and the School Committee, for the schematic design services to construct or expand the Driscoll School, with the condition that no funding may be used for the design of non-emergency fossil fuel-operated building systems, and to meet the appropriation transfer \$1,300,000 from the overlay surplus account and \$200,000 from free cash.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to acquire, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise, in fee simple, the parcels of land located at 15-19 Oak Street, Brookline Massachusetts, including all buildings and structures thereon and all privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging, all interests held pursuant to M.G.L. c.

183A, as well as all trees and shrubs thereon, consisting of approximately 8,209 square feet, for general municipal purposes, and for all purposes and uses accessory thereto, including but not limited to the construction or expansion of school educational facilities and amenities, and that to meet such expenditure to appropriate a sum of money to be expended at the direction of the Selectmen, to pay costs of acquiring said property, and for the payment of all costs incidental and related thereto, and to determine whether such amount shall be raised by taxation, transfer from available funds, borrowing or otherwise; to authorize the Select Board to apply for, accept and expend any grants from any source whatsoever that may be available to pay any portion of this project or to take any other action relative thereto.

Moderator Edward N. Gadsby – TMM #AL stated that both Article Three and Article Four would be debated together.

The following main motion was offered by Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL and seconded by Bernard W. Greene – TMM #AL, for the Select Board, under Article Three:

MOVED: That the Town release for expenditure the \$1,500,000 appropriated under Section 13, Special Appropriation No. 65 of Article 7 of the 2018 Annual Town Meeting as provided in said appropriation for Schematic Design Services for the Baldwin School.

Upon motion of Sean M. Lynn-Jones – TMM #1 and seconded by Mariah C. Nobrega- TMM #4, for the Advisory Committee, the following amendment was offered to the Select Board’s main motion, under Article Three:

MOVED: To add the words “with the condition that no funding may be used for the design of non-emergency fossil fuel-operated building systems.”

Upon motion of John Doggett – TM #13 and duly seconded, the following substitute motion was offered, under Article Three:

MOVED: That the Town re-appropriate and release for expenditure the \$1,500,000 appropriated under Section 13, Special Appropriation No. 65 of Article 7 of the 2018 Annual Town Meeting as provided in said appropriation for plans to address and remediate sub-standard pedagogical and common spaces in the Baker, Heath, Lawrence, Lincoln and Runkle schools, such plans to be consistent with the goal of maintaining Brookline’s neighborhood schools.

The following main motion was offered by Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL and seconded by Bernard W. Greene – TMM #AL, for the Select Board, under Article Four:

MOVED: That the Town authorize the Select Board to acquire, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise, in fee simple, the parcels of land located at 15-19 Oak Street, Brookline Massachusetts, including all buildings and structures thereon and all privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging, all interests held pursuant to M.G.L. c. 183A, as well as all trees and shrubs thereon, consisting of approximately 8,209 square feet, for general municipal purposes, and for all purposes and uses accessory thereto, including but not limited to the construction or expansion of school educational facilities and amenities, and that to meet such expenditure authorize the Treasurer, with approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow \$4,700,000, under General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7(1). Any premium received upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this vote, less any such premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds or notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this vote in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 20 of the General Laws, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

Bernard W. Greene – TMM #AL, for a unanimous Select Board, discussed traffic mitigation efforts for the Baldwin proposal and stated that numerous legal complaints, filed by parents of various students with disabilities in Brookline’s public schools, alleging conditions in the public schools have resulted in their children being deprived the right to free and appropriate public education. He also noted that the Baldwin School proposal was a great opportunity for Brookline to move forward towards its goal for zero emissions in Town buildings. Select Board Member Greene urged favorable action on the Select Board’s main motion under Article Three and no action on the substitute motion.

Julie Schreiner-Oldham , Vice Chair of the School Committee, and Co-Chair of the Baldwin School Building Committee, stated that this proposal before Town Meeting addresses the plan put forward last year by Mariah C. Nobrega and embraced by Town Meeting, that asked for a North-South solution to the Town’s enrollment and renovation needs. Vice Chair Schreiner-Oldham stated while Baldwin is integral to the Town’s three school approach, it is necessary due to the anticipated enrollment demands from South Brookline, especially Hancock Village. Vice Chair Schreiner-Oldham urges favorable actions on the main motion s offered under Article Three and Article Four.

David Quinn Gacioch – TMM #13, a Heath School parent and a former member of the Baldwin School Building Committee, stated that you do not have to be pro-Baldwin, to be pro-school, pro-student and pro-teacher. He noted that class sizes in the

third grade and lower are small because the enrollment trend has changed and geography matters. North Brookline schools continue to increase in enrollment while South Brookline continues to drop, It is time to take a step back and reassess this plan. Mr. Gacioch stated that since we have just finished the Coolidge Corner School, voted Driscoll School earlier this evening and have just received MSB partnership for Pierce School, that the Town is well on its way to resolving its enrollment issue and that we do not need Baldwin School.

Linda Olson Pehlke – TMM #2, stated that the projected student enrollment is to drop by more than 500 students over the next decade and provides the Town with an opportunity to reassess its plan to address overcrowding. Ms. Pehlke also raised concerns over traffic and parking issues. She also noted that the Transportation Department did not have enough time to assess the feasibility of the Baldwin site. Ms. Pehlke urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee’s substitute motion offered by John Doggett – TMM #13.

John R. VanScoyoc– TMM #13, stated that the proposal for the new Baldwin School is the wrong school, in the wrong place , at the wrong time. He added that it is a misguided proposal for a number of reasons. He stated that the recommended early start time, due to traffic considerations, will deprive children of necessary sleep required for good education and good health. He noted that the American Academy of Pediatrics and the Centers for Disease Control have both stated that sleep deprived American school children who suffer from insufficient sleep can lead to significant health risks and are urging for later school start times not earlier ones. Mr. VanScoyoc also noted that the new Baldwin proposal, offered under Article Three and Article Four, ignores the declining trend in enrollment. He added that this proposal was a very poor third choice. Mr. VanScoyoc urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee’s substitute motion offered by John Doggett – TMM #13 and no action on the main motion under Article Four.

Michael A. Sandman – TMM #3, for a minority of the Advisory Committee, stated that the rationale behind the Doggett substitute motion is that we can solve overcrowding by adding 128,00 additional square feet at five K through 8 schools, with expand-in place proposals. He added that this rationale has changed radically in recent days by cutting it back to 54,000 square feet and two schools. Mr. Sandman urged Town meeting not to waste \$1.5 million on a build in place plan that doesn’t do the job. Mr. Sandman urged no action on the Advisory Committee’s substitute motion and favorable action on the Select Board’s main motion under Article Three.

John Doggett – TMM #13, for a majority of the Advisory Committee, stated that the substitute motion does address five schools. Mr. Doggett stated that since the student enrollment data has been revised the Baldwin school proposal has morphed into a plan to now address various overcrowded spaces within the public school system. Supporting the substitute motion, he argued, presses the re-set button and offers a better way forward. Mr. Doggett urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee’s substitute motion.

David M. Pollak – TMM #11, Chair of the School Committee, stated that for more than a decade the Town has been scouring for additional school sites, analyzing our enrollment, planning additions, reconstructions, and building and yet there still isn't remotely enough space to meet the needs of our students. Mr. Pollack then reviewed the ten year history of planning and enrollment. He stated that we need a new school to desperately address the system-wide overcrowding. Mr. Pollack urged favorable action on the Select Board's main motion under Article Three.

Lauren Sara Bernard - TMM #8, stated that you do not have to be pro-Baldwin to be pro-schools. Many Town Meeting Members are uneasy voting for a ninth elementary school, whose necessity is now questionable and whose purpose is ever changing, especially when it results in asking the voters for another \$100 million override that many can no longer afford. Ms. Bernard urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee's substitute motion and no action on the main motions under Article Three and Article Four.

Mariah C. Nobrega – TMM #4, stated that in spite of what looks like a beautiful design, she can't say she is more than a reluctant supporter of the Baldwin proposal. She added that it is not because of the recently revised and corrected enrollment projections, or months of questions going unanswered; nor is it just because of the lack of transparency of our boards who selected this Baldwin plan without considering another Baldwin plan as an option; it's not just because of the legal issues or because of the neighborhood concerns; nor is it just because of the environmental, walkability and open space issues. Ms. Nobrega stated that none of these concerns change the fact that our schools are overcrowded now. She added that she is reluctant about this proposal not because of any one of these issues but because of all of them. She stated that this is just not a very good idea but it is the only option on the table for a ninth school. She stated that she would not attempt to ask Town Meeting to vote the Advisory Committee's substitute motion, but should it fail, she does ask that they join with her as a reluctant supporter of Baldwin because the schools are overcrowded, that Driscoll and Pierce are not enough and that Baldwin is all that we've got and because she trusts that the Select Board and the School Committee have the vision and the leadership to make this a better plan.

Janet Kahn – TMM #15, stated that parents in her neighborhood have expressed their desire not to have their children relocated from Heath School to Baldwin School. She stated that building this school will cause a massive redistricting and relocation of students from several schools. She added that the Advisory Committee's substitute motion, offered by John Doggett - TM #13, is the only plan before us that is a flexible way forward to better meet the needs of our public school children. Ms. Kahn urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee's substitute motion and no action on the main motions offered by the Select Board under Article Three and Article Four.

Deborah Abner, a resident of the Town of Brookline, a member of the Baldwin School Building Committee, and the Librarian at the William H. Lincoln Elementary School, reviewed the overcrowded and noisy conditions at the Lincoln school over the

past decade. She stated that 18 of the 22 specialized learning centers do not meet the state standard. Ms. Abner urged favorable action on the main motions offered under Article Three and Article Four.

Harry K. Friedman – TMM #12, stated the selection for the ninth school site has been flawed from the beginning. He noted that the legal costs from the various lawsuits could be high and could last for years. He added that this site will cause terrible traffic issues. Mr. Friedman stated that the three-school approach will not right all of the wrongs that affect our various school buildings. He added that the philosophy of just do something now will not lead us to where we need to be. Mr. Friedman urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee's substitute motion and no action on the main motions under Article Three and Article Four.

Kate Poverman – TMM #8, stated that autistic children have special challenges in communicating. They often have to learn how to speak, learn social skills and learn how to interact. In order for these children to learn, they need quiet spaces. Ms. Poverman stated that instead, these children are being pulled into closets and placed into hallways – spaces that are simply not conducive to their needs. She stated that the Baldwin School will present state of the art facilities for all children as well as many special needs children. Ms. Poverman urged favorable action on the main motion offered under Article Three and Article Four.

Jane C. Gilman - TMM #3, stated that the Baldwin School site is a crapshoot subject to a number of lawsuits. She added that the substitute motion is to spend the \$1.5 million to rank order our needs. She stated that it is a more subtle approach to address the Town's needs. Ms. Gilman stated that the urgency of our climate crisis is fused to our vote tonight. She noted that the use of open space or parkland for school buildings is a loss of key assets for climate change resiliency. Ms. Gilman urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee's substitute motion.

Scott C. Gladstone – TMM #16, stated that this is a legitimate but a political issue. He stated that he believes the various lawsuits and complaints are frivolous and absurd. Mr. Gladstone urged favorable action on the main motions offered under Article Three and Four and no action on the Advisory Committee's substitute motion.

Clifford Scott Ananian – TMM #10, stated that he believe that the substitute motion is the necessary step to reunify our town and allow us to move forward and address the real needs we have in our schools. He stated that we need to improve a variety of spaces and classrooms and that we need to do it now and not in 2025. Mr. Ananian added that the substitute motion lets us concentrate on remedying those priorities. Mr. Ananian urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee's main motion offered by John Doggett - TMM #13.

The Moderator, Edward N. Gadsby, Jr. – TMM #AL, entertained a motion to call the question made by Michael A. Burstein – TMM #12, which was duly seconded.

Mark E. Levy – TMM #7, raised a point of order and asked the Moderator if Town Meeting were to call the question would the meeting proceed directly to a vote or would the Town Meeting have an opportunity to ask questions. The Moderator, Edward N. Gadsby, Jr. – TMM #AL, stated that if Town Meeting were to vote to terminate debate then the meeting would move directly to vote on the various motions offered under Articles Three and Four. The Moderator then read the names of the remaining speakers who had signed up to speak on the Articles.

Upon motion made and duly seconded, it was by TWO-THIRDS

VOTED: To terminate debate.

Irene Scharf - TMM #16 doubted the vote and requested an electronic recorded vote. The Moderator determined that there were seven Town Meeting Members who doubted the declared vote and he called for an electronic recorded vote.

Upon motion made and duly seconded, and failing a TWO-THIRDS vote, the following motion was DEFEATED by an ELECTRONIC RECORDED VOTE OF 119 IN FAVOR, 87 OPPOSED AND 17 ABSTENTIONS
[SEE ADDENDUM]

MOVED: To terminate debate.

Jennifer Goldsmith – TMM #11 raised a point of order and asked the Moderator if Town Meeting could vote on asking questions rather than hear more speakers. The Moderator stated that Town Meeting cannot vote to ask questions but that he will permit questions after several more speakers.

David C. Lescohier – TMM #11 stated that we can all agree on the substandard conditions in our schools. He challenged Town Meeting to aim high and construct a new Baldwin School. He urged no action on the Advisory Committee/Doggett substitute motion and favorable action on the Select Board’s main motion.

Donald G. Leka - TMM #3 pleaded with Town Meeting not to be intimidated by the chamber of horrors that some predict will happen if the Town does not build Baldwin School. Mr. Leka stated that Town Meeting now knows that the failed student tsunami was based on false enrollment data. He added that the proponents then had to scramble around for new arguments. He stated that the three-school approach of Coolidge Corner, Driscoll and Pierce will create sufficient capacity to absorb additional students if necessary. Mr. Leka urged favorable action on the Advisory Committee’s Doggett substitute motion and no action on the Select Board’s main motion.

The Moderator, Edward N. Gadsby, Jr. – TMM #AL allowed a number of questions concerning school redistricting; the number of sections at Driscoll; estimated building costs to address the current town-wide substandard conditions; availability for parents to opt-in to the Baldwin School; the value of the Doggett motion if expand in

place is maximized; the question of build-up if a particular site is land-locked; whether the Town has an update on the current litigation over the school; walkable neighborhood schools; and if there are plans for relocating the Brookline School Staff and Children Center (BSSCC) if Baldwin is rebuilt.

Upon motion made and duly seconded, a TWO-THIRDS vote being required, the following motion was PASSED by an ELECTRONIC RECORDED VOTE OF 174 IN FAVOR, 45 OPPOSED AND 11 ABSTENTIONS

VOTED: To terminate debate.

There was a request that an Electronic Recorded Vote be taken under Article Three. Thirty-five Town Meeting Members stood in support of that request.

Upon motion of John Doggett – TMM #13 and duly seconded, the following motion was DEFEATED, by an ELECTRONIC RECORDED VOTE OF 86 IN FAVOR, 140 OPPOSED AND 4 ABSTENTIONS

MOVED: That the Town re-appropriate and release for expenditure the \$1,500,000 appropriated under Section 13, Special Appropriation No. 65 of Article 7 of the 2018 Annual Town Meeting as provided in said appropriation for plans to address and remediate sub-standard pedagogical and common spaces in the Baker, Heath, Lawrence, Lincoln and Runkle schools, such plans to be consistent with the goal of maintaining Brookline's neighborhood schools.

Upon motion of Sean M. Lynn-Jones – TMM #1 and duly seconded, it was by a Majority

VOTED: To amend the main motion under Article Three by adding the following language “, with the condition that no funding may be used for the design of non-emergency fossil fuel-operated building systems.”

There was a request that an Electronic Recorded Vote be taken under the Article Three main motion, as amended. Thirty-five Town Meeting Members stood in support of that request.

Upon motion of Neil Wishinsky - TMM #AL and duly seconded, it was, AS AMENDED, by an ELECTRONIC RECORDED VOTE OF 162 IN FAVOR, 58 OPPOSED AND 11 ABSTENTIONS

VOTED: That the Town release for expenditure the \$1,500,000 appropriated under Section 13, Special Appropriation No. 65 of Article 7 of the 2018 Annual Town Meeting as provided in said appropriation for Schematic Design Services for the Baldwin School, with the condition that

no funding may be used for the design of non-emergency fossil fuel-operated building systems.

[SEE ADDENDUM]

The Moderator, Edward N. Gadsby, Jr. – TMM #AL stated that he would entertain brief remarks under Article Four.

Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL, for the Select Board, stated that the Town has reached voluntary agreement with three property owners to sell their homes at market rate. He stated that while it is not a lot of land it is in the right place and will make for a better project at Baldwin School. He stated that a unanimous Select Board urges favorable action under Article Four.

John R. Van Scoyoc – TMM #13 stated that there is a substantial body of Town Meeting Members who voted for the Doggett substitute motion, who think going forward with the Baldwin project is a bad mistake. Mr. VanScoyoc stated that he plans to vote against this authorization.

Elisabeth W. Cunningham – TMM #15 stated that she opposes this article because she believe the destruction of these townhouses is environmentally unfriendly.

There was a request that an Electronic Recorded Vote be taken under the Article Four main motion. Thirty-five Town Meeting Members stood in support of that request.

Upon motion of Neil Wishinsky – TMM #AL and duly seconded, a TWO-THIRDS required, it was by an ELECTRONIC RECORDED VOTE OF 143 IN FAVOR, 66 OPPOSED AND 6 ABSTENTIONS

VOTED: That the Town authorize the Select Board to acquire, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise, in fee simple, the parcels of land located at 15-19 Oak Street, Brookline Massachusetts, including all buildings and structures thereon and all privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging, all interests held pursuant to M.G.L. c. 183A, as well as all trees and shrubs thereon, consisting of approximately 8,209 square feet, for general municipal purposes, and for all purposes and uses accessory thereto, including but not limited to the construction or expansion of school educational facilities and amenities, and that to meet such expenditure authorize the Treasurer, with approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow \$4,700,000, under General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7(1). Any premium received upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this vote, less any such premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds or notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this vote in accordance with Chapter 44,

Section 20 of the General Laws, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

Land Description:

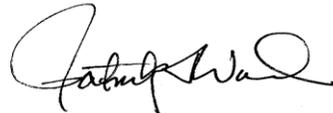
